CASE FOR STANDARDS & GOALS



Case for Standards

- Improve the practices & increase the effectiveness of charitable & nonprofit organizations
- Promote transparency & accountability in the sector to help maintain public trust
- May help stave off further government regulation



Goals

- 1. To foster public trust, promote confidence in the sector and protect both the credibility of the sector and the interests of the public.
- 2. To help charities and nonprofits improve their practices by providing educational tools and capacity-building initiatives.
- 3. To demonstrate the accountability of the sector to the public.
- 4. To continually evolve and enhance the standards and accreditation processes for the benefit of Canada's voluntary sector.
- 5. To create a community of practice in the charitable and nonprofit sector.
- 6. To unite the charitable and nonprofit sector through shared standards that demonstrate good governance of the community organizations that the public entrusts us to lead.



BACKGROUND& REVIEW OF THE PROCESS



Background - Dialogue & Consultation with the Sector

- Since 2006 Imagine Canada has been facilitating a discussion of standards for the charitable and nonprofit sector and gathering feedback through a series of webinars, discussion papers, and presentations.
- Feedback from the sector, a Standards Forum was held in March 2010.



March 2010 Standards Forum

- Over 200 people participated in-person and via webcast.
- Imagine Canada provided a detailed proposal for the development of a Standards Program.
- Following a discussion, the group was in agreement with the general direction of the Program and agreed with the development of foundational standards in four areas:
 - Governance
 - Financial Accountability
 - Paid Staff Management
 - Volunteer Involvement



Founding Members

- Following the Forum, 51 organizations became Founding Members of the Standards Program.
- These early adopters agreed to a shared leadership approach and committed financial support to the development of the Standards Program.
- The Founding Members worked with Imagine Canada in 2010 to shape the development of the Program.



Standards Steering Committee

- Twenty-seven organizations sat on the Standards Steering Committee, which led the development of the Program.
- This group:
 - Developed a model outlining how organizations will be accredited
 - Updated and revised the standards
 - Identified capacity-building activities to complement the standards
 - Proposed a governance structure and budget for the Program
 - Provided input on brand identity for the initiative




STANDARDS PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Board/staff of participating organizations sign "participation agreement" & begin application readiness process with support of Standards staff and access to resources

Includes online selfassessment, electronic application manual/guide, & support/consultation with Standards staff who will access volunteer peer reviewers/mentors and resources to assist organizations in their preparation for application Board/staff of participating organization submit application & supporting documentation for review by peer review committee

Intake periods for peer review committees will occur twice a year

Decision Process

Peer review committee meets twice per year to review applications and prepare reports (i.e. 2 intake periods annually)

- 1. Accreditation
- 2. Conditional Accreditation (90% Compliance)
- 3. Revise & Resubmit*
- 4. Non-accreditation

*The Revise and Resubmit process could include a teleweb/teleconference communication or onsite visit if determined appropriate by the peer review committee.

Capacity Building

- Capacity-building efforts will be scaled to match staff capacity, participant needs, and funding and will be rolled out as the program grows.
- Publicly available information and resources will include the standards and supporting evidence, a searchable database of existing tools and resources, and information on training opportunities.
- Information available to participants will include an accreditation handbook, a discount code for training, assistance from staff, the opportunity to have a staff member sit on a peer review committee, and an online community network.



Standards

Standards are grouped into five key areas:

- 1. Governance
- 2. Financial Accountability
- 3. Staff Management
- 4. Volunteer Involvement
- 5. Fundraising

In recognition of the diversity of the charitable and nonprofit sector, the standards are grouped into three levels:

- Organizations with less than 1 FTE,
- Organizations with 1- 50 FTEs and operating expenses up to \$5 million,
- Organizations with more than 50 FTEs or operating expenses of more than \$5 million.



PROGRAM PILOT



Program Pilot

- We are piloting the program in 2011
- All founding members (52) were being invited to participate in the pilot and 27 of them have agreed to do so.
- Participating organizations signed a "participation agreement" that explains how the program works, what their rights and responsibilities are, etc. and pay the applicable fee.
- Web conferences were held with pilot participants between April and August to answer questions and share resources.
- Completed application forms were due November 30.
- We hope to be able to announce the first group of accredited organizations by April 2012.
