CODE-NGO Condemns the Supreme Court's Grant of Quo Warranto Petition

We, the Caucus of Development NGO Networks (CODE-NGO), the largest coalition of civil society organizations in the country, condemns the Supreme Court's granting of the quo warranto petition filed by Solicitor General Jose Calida to oust Chief Justice Maria Lourdes Sereno.

A quo warranto proceeding – Latin for “by what authority” – is a legal remedy designed to resolve a dispute over whether a specific person has the legal right to hold the public office that s/he occupies. It is used to test a person's legal right to hold an office, not to evaluate the person's performance in the office.

The Value of Partnerships in Finding Innovation

On May 24, 2018, the Caucus of Development NGO Networks (CODE-NGO) was invited to be part of a panel with the Humanitarian Leadership Academy (HLA), Cooperative Development Authority (CDA), and the Provincial Government of Cebu. The panel was chaired by the Partnerships Brokers Association and aimed to show best practices in multi-stakeholder collaborations.

CODE-NGO was there to share their experiences with their current partnership with HLA. The partnership entails a pilot of mixed learning courses on Community Based Disaster Risk Reduction Management and the conduct of a Service Continuity Planning Workshop for three sub-national DRRM hubs of CODE-NGO located in Benguet, Cebu, and CARAGA. The project is aptly called Blended Learning Approach to Strength DRRM or BLAST DRRM.

Country's First Local Fundraising Consortium Launched

Shared Aid Fund for Emergency Response to provide quick, localized assistance to disaster-stricken communities

MANILA, Philippines—The country's first locally led fundraising mechanism for disaster response and relief, Shared Aid Fund for Emergency Response (SAFER), was launched and introduced to the sector's key actors and stakeholders today, May 15, at the PETA Theater Center in Quezon City.

SAFER combines the network and capabilities of Caucus of Development NGOs (CODE-NGO), Humanitarian Response Consortium (HRC), and CBCP NASSA/Caritas Philippines to address the gaps in financing local disaster relief efforts.

Through SAFER's efforts and the geographical spread of its three founding networks, aid will be localized from end to end. From fund collection to providing aid, SAFER is able to identify the needs of the affected households and communities on the ground and provide assistance in the quickest manner.
