- 1. The session featured stories and experiences of 3 cooperatives in these tight times:
 - San Dionisio Cooperative, Paranaque City
 - Baao Parish Multipurpose Cooperative, Camarines Sur
 - Oro Integrated Cooperative, Cagayan de Oro
- 2. How the cooperatives coped or are coping with the pandemic
 - Created sense of security in members- continued interest payment, ICPR distribution, ManCom meetings, FB announcements, BOD meetings
 - Enhanced loan moratorium, ex. extension of loans to reduce amount of monthly amortization, deferment of payment (with time limit), loan refinancing, restructured loan
 - Care for employee's health, safety, welfare, ex. flexible work arrangement, proportionate 13th month pay, approval of new leave credits and one-time hazard pay, gave them peace of mind
 - Care for leaders, ex. came up with crisis management guidelines, Crisis Management Team
 - Care for members through more compassion, ex. loan arrangements, emergency assistance, no court filing, cash assistance, no demotion of membership classification, released dividends of 2019
 - Relaunched existing loan products; enhanced members' services, ex. health care assistance, free laboratory services, mortuary assistance benefits
 - Donated rice to the LGU and food packs to frontliners
 - Controlled liquidity by controlling releases of big loans
 - Amended operational guidelines, ex. loan approval and disbursement via email, cash float approval via email
 - Focus on liquidity management, loan extension, remedial strategies
- 3. What solutions, good practices, or innovations are inspiring in these difficult times
 - Use of online transaction using KAYA cards and ATMs
 - "Home delivery" of loan releases to members
 - New types of loan created, ex. computer, motorcycle, bicycle loans
 - B.E.E.F. program to help alleviate marginalized members from poverty; focuses on business, employment, education, and food
 - Set up chat groups among Pook-Tulungan units, which implemented programs and projects, promoted action based on basic philosophy and principles of coops, community building and increase value of cooperativism
 - Agri-product consolidation (for vegetables and corn); marketing members' products through online services
 - Digitization and online services, ex. loan application, membership application, loan payments and deposits



- 4. What lessons or insights did they gain/do they want to impart
 - Importance of digital technology in doing business
 - Leadership (governance and management) roles are important; if united then able to come up with fast decisions
 - Spirit of volunteerism very much alive; emphasize self-responsibility, volunteerism, and sense of ownership; servant leadership
 - Members willing to share benefits even to non-members
 - Importance of funds, ex. reserve fund, optional fund, emergency fund
 - Importance of coop education and values
 - A lot of networking
 - Uncertainty breeds creativity, innovative perspective that leads to accepting change
 - Adhere to prudent financial standards cooperatives become resilient by being disciplined according to these standards
 - Business continuity planning is significant
 - Well-informed and values-driven members enable cooperatives to sail through the storm

5. Ways forward

For the upcoming 60-day moratorium required by Bayanihan Act Two:

- Strengthen liquidity position
- Control/manage loan releases
- Monitor daily cash position
- Reassess mitigation strategies in Bayanihan One
